

Frankenstein Synopsis

Victor Frankenstein brings to life a creature made from human corpses, but recoils in horror at its appearance and abandons it. The creature, lost and confused, stumbles upon a scene where a prostitute named Gretel is being assaulted. The creature scares off the attacker but is rejected by Gretel and chased away by a mob.

Seeking refuge, the creature hides in the cottage of Felix and Agatha, learning about humanity and love from the blind De Lacey.
